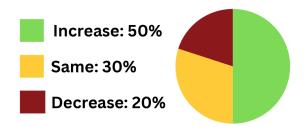

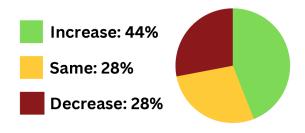

How are top line sales expected to change in the next 12 months?



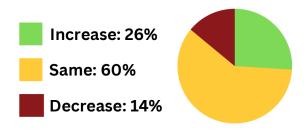
PROFITS

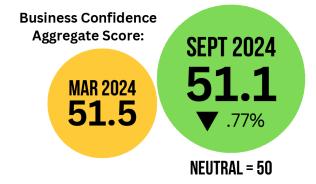
How is profit expected to change in the next 12 months?

How is the level of employment expected to change in the next 12 months?



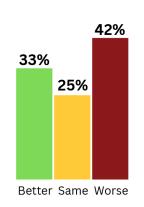


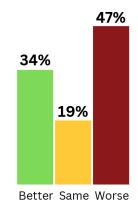

How will general business conditions in Shasta County change in the next 12 months?

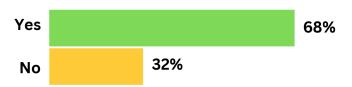
US BUSINESS CONDITIONS

Unemployment in Shasta County recently rose to 5.8%, a slight improvement from the 6.5% rate at the beginning of 2024. However, the shortage of available workers remains a significant challenge for local employers. Over the past decade, the demand for skilled labor has been a persistent issue, but now there is an even more pressing concern: the overall lack of available workers. Since 2008, Shasta County's labor force has shrunk by over 12,000 people, and the labor force participation rate stands at just 50.9% as of July, ranking 48th out of 58 counties in California.

To address these challenges, we need to focus on increasing labor force participation and expanding our available workforce. Attracting new talent to Shasta County is essential, and this requires a comprehensive approach that highlights our region's exceptional recreational opportunities, quality of life, and affordability. Moving forward, we must collaborate with our partners to showcase all that Shasta County has to offer, ensuring we draw both skilled and general workers to the area.
